NH House tables LGBTQ bills that critics called discriminatory

The New Hampshire House ... shelved two bills critics said would have harmed the state's LGBTQ population by allowing so-called gay conversion therapy and discrimination against transgender people. New Hampshire banned the scientifically discredited practice of using therapy to "convert" LGBTQ children to heterosexuality or traditional gender expectations in 2018, but a bill introduced this year would have repealed that law. An amended version ... would have kept the ban in place but only in cases where such therapy is "against an individual's will." NH House kills controversial parental rights bill opposed by Sununu

The New Hampshire Senate approved the parental rights bill in a party-line vote, but the measure died in the House after some Republicans joined Democrats to block it. Republicans failed to muster enough support at the State House Thursday to pass a controversial parental rights bill that Gov. Chris Sununu was already vowing to veto. While the bill passed the Senate on party lines, it narrowly died in the House, after some Republican lawmakers joined with Democrats in opposition. NH House Bill 1431 would have expanded parents' oversight over their kids' curriculum and activities at public schools. And it would have expanded parents' ability to sue schools and teachers over grievances.
